

Did you know?

Production of recycled paper uses 80% less water, 65% less energy and produces 95% less air pollution than paper production using raw materials.

Recycling aluminum uses 95% less energy than producing cans from new metal ore.

Glass recycling saves 25 to 32% of the energy used to make new glass and reduces related air pollution by 20% and water pollution by 50%.

Recycling 1 ton of plastic saves 685 gallons of oil.

Recycling in Lexington

Recycling is available to all residents living in single family homes, apartments, townhouses and condos through their garbage hauler.



Thank you for your continued recycling efforts.

Lexington households average
426 pounds of recycling every year!

Please review the list of materials that can be recycled and recycle more if you can.

Curbside Collection of Recyclables

Set recyclables at the curb by 7 a.m. Place recycling container at least 4 feet away from garbage can. During snow season, please keep garbage can and recycling container away from the pathway of the plow. Collection is every other week, the same day as garbage. Call your hauler to obtain a recycling cart.

Do not place recyclables in plastic bags.

Aluminum Cans

Aluminum Foil – wipe off food debris

Glass – food/beverage, bottles & jars; rinse

Paper

mail, office & school papers

magazines & catalogs

newspapers & inserts

phone books

shredded paper in closed paper bags

cardboard boxes – flatten

cereal, cracker, pasta & cake mix boxes

shoe boxes, gift boxes & electronics boxes

boxes from toothpaste, medications & other toiletries

paper towel & toilet paper cores



Food Box Guidelines: Boxes from items meant to go in your cupboard (cereal, etc.) are generally recyclable. Packages for refrigerated and microwaveable products, such as frozen entrees, are usually coated in ways that make them unacceptable for recycling.

Plastic – #1 & #2 bottles & jugs with a neck & a screw-on lid; NO fertilizer, pesticide chemical or automotive fluid containers; rinse & throw away lid

Steel Food Cans – rinse
